### Teaching problem and solution for Kindergarten and First ...

To step into a problem-solving mindset, young children need to first learn to manage their emotions. ### Teaching problem solving: Let students get 'stuck' and ...

Give students an example of a problem that happened in class. Situations on problem and solution present themselves daily in an elementary classroom. If you have none recent to use, tell about one from your life. Explain and define the problem. Once you get to the place in the story where the problem has been resolved, explain that this is a solution. It is important to introduce and use the proper vocabulary terms even for younger students.

### Problem and Solution Reading Activities with Graphic ...

Tell students that together you are going to learn how to identify the problem and solution in a story. Review the definition of problem (the conflict that gets in the way of the main character getting what they want or need) and solution (a resolution or answer that helps the main character solve the problem; the solution is not always the conclusion of the story).

Present students with various scenarios in which there is a conflict or problem. Ask them to come up with a way to discuss and solve the issue. Reinforce good choices and make suggestions for choices the students make that are not good. Discussion of problems and solutions can be done throughout the school year. Students can keep notes in a journal.

### **Teaching Problem Solving Skills-Useful Suggestions ...**

It involves overcoming obstacles by generating hypo-theses, testing those predictions, and arriving at satisfactory solutions. Problem-solving involves three basic functions: Seeking information. Generating new knowledge. Making decisions. Problem-solving is, and should be, a very real part of the curriculum. It presupposes that students can take on some of the responsibility for their own learning and can take personal action to solve problems, resolve conflicts, discuss alternatives, and ...
